Memories of Goose Creek School No. 4

The Hardin County Farm Museum is fortunate to be the home to many historical items, both big and small. On the bigger side of things, there are several noteworthy buildings on the grounds including the original Goose Creek School. The schoolhouse found a permanent home at the museum in 2000 when it was moved there. A foundation was poured and repairs made so it could be opened to the public. The school has been fully refurnished with donated items and even has the original teacher's desk and blackboards. It is truly a gem



and the Hardin County Farm Museum is very lucky to have this schoolhouse as part of its collection.

If only the walls of the Goose Creek School could talk, think of all the stories it could tell of the hundreds of students who came through its door every morning for 71 years. Built in 1882, Goose Creek School No. 4 was located seven miles southwest of Eldora in the NW 1/4 of Section 20 Pleasant Township. It was built above the south bank of Goose Creek, a beautiful, small meandering creek that empties into the South Fork of the Iowa River. This one room school house holds many memories for its former students. We are fortunate to share the memories of Goose Creek School student, Laura Ziesman Lange. She attended this schoolhouse from her kindergarten year, 1927, through her eighth grade graduation in 1936. Laura was born in 1922 on the family farm just north of the schoolhouse. across the timber where Goose Creek still runs today. Laura is now 102 years young, still lives on her own, and has vivid memories as clear as the days when she attended Goose Creek School. She reminisces about walking to school with her brother Albert, who was two years older, and as a kindergartener, she was very happy to have him to walk with. Soon sister Reba, who was two years younger, joined in. Laura said they walked



to school no matter what the weather was. If it was cold, they put more clothes on to keep warm. They were lucky and only had a little over a quarter mile to walk on the dirt road while some of the students walked up to two miles. The two sisters always walked on the road and didn't cut through the timber. But Laura remembers several instances when Albert ran late doing his chores, so he would climb over the fence. jump across Goose Creek, run up the hills of the timber, and get to the door of the one room school just at the last possible second so he wouldn't be tardy!

The best part of school for Laura was getting to see the other kids. There wasn't a lot of socializing at that time, so going to school and church were the only chances she would get to be with other kids. She fondly looks back on the close knit neighborhood, and can still name every family that lived there at that time. Since her family farm was close to the school, it was right in the middle of all the school family's farms. There were the Strucks, the Wassons, the Boodys, the Hubbards, the Clarks, and the Bahrs, among others. She has remained friends with many generations of these families all of her life.

The teachers during the time Laura went to school were young ladies who had to be at least 18 years old and unmarried. Laura still remembers her teachers fondly. Her first grade teacher was Miss Ziesman (Helen Cable), and her fifth grade teacher was Miss Kusserow (Agnes Dobbrunz). Laura added that the teachers would room with a family that lived close by during the week, and even her family had teachers room with them for a time. She recalls students took their studies very seriously and were mostly well behaved. They knew if there were shenanigans that they would not only be reprimanded at school, but also pay the consequences at home. Laura said the teacher would work with one age group of students at a time while the others did their studies. She said all their work was done at school and they did not bring work home. She recalls that the school day went from 9:00 - 4:00 with a one hour break over the noon hour. In the winter Laura remembers having a 30 minute lunch so that they could get home before dark in order to get their barn chores done. She fondly recalls lunch in the winter. Normally students would bring a metal lunch pail with goodies from home that would include a jelly sandwich. But in the winter when the teacher had the stove stoked with wood or corn cobs to heat the one room school, Laura recalls the students brought jars of home canned soup or home canned meat, placed them in a porcelain bowl full of water on top of the black iron stove, and as the water boiled it would heat their canning jar lunch.

Laura joked that was the best "hot lunch". 😊

During the years Laura attended Goose Creek School, the school had no electricity and no running water. Bathrooms were two outhouses. Water was fetched from the nearby Wasson farm to the west. She said two students would walk every morning carrying a water bucket with a lid to fill with fresh water from the neighbor's well. They would take turns carrying the full bucket back and pour it into the stoneware water crock that had a spigot for dispensing the drinking water. Each student brought an aluminum or porcelain cup from home on Mondays, hung it on a hook by the water crock, and this would be their drinking cup for the week.

Laura recalls that sometimes the younger students would complete two grades in one year as was the case with her younger sister Reba. So when Laura graduated eighth grade in May of 1936 at the age of 14, so did her sister Reba, who was only 12. Laura remembers taking her graduation exam and was very



proud to get her 8th grade diploma from the Goose Creek School.

After graduation Laura went to work for many neighboring families helping care for their newborn babies. Laura was married in November of 1943, was a hard working farm wife, and is a devoted mother of five children, ten grandchildren, thirteen great grandchildren, and one great-great grandchild.

Many thanks to Laura Lange for reflecting back on her Goose Creek School days and sharing her memories with us. This picture of Laura was taken the week of her 102^{nd} birthday in February. She is truly one remarkable and blessed lady who has seen many, many changes during her lifetime! O
